## **General Rules & Regulations**

1. The Fair is open to everyone.
2. There is no entry fee.
3. All exhibitors **MUST** be the bona fide maker or grower of their exhibits. Use of Commercially produced products will result in forfeiture of ALL prizes won by the exhibitor. If any exhibitor tries to deceive the committee more than once, the committee may ban that exhibitor from future competitions.
4. All exhibits must be clean and free of pet hair, and not previously entered in our Fair.
5. Only one entry per class unless otherwise stated.
6. Classes are subject to change (at the discretion of the Directors and Judges) if there are insufficient entries for the competition.
7. Families may include all entries on the same entry form included in this catalogue.
8. \*Gates are open to bench entries on Saturday from 9:00 am - 12:00 pm. No entries will be accepted after 12:00 pm; judging will commence at 1:00 pm.\*
9. The Bench Show opens to the public when judging is complete at approximately 4:30 pm on Saturday. Show re-opens at 10:00 am on Sunday. Viewing opportunities and Demos on Saturday and Sunday.
10. Ages of children (12 and under) and teens (13-19) must be stated on the entry tag, otherwise the entry will be placed in an adult class.
11. No ribbons or exhibits are to be removed before 4:30 pm on Sunday.
12. No food, no drinks, and no smoking is permitted in the exhibition area.
13. See additional rules and regulations under each section of the catalogue

## **Interpretation of Rules**

1. Interpretation of all rules shall be made by the Board of Directors, whose decision shall be final. Should any question arise not provided for in the Rules and Regulations section, the decision of the Board of Directors shall be final.
2. The right to alter, interpret, amend, add to or cancel any of these rules, or to grant relaxation from them in individual cases is reserved to the Board of Directors.

## **Liability Defined**

All properties of exhibitors entered for competition shall be subject to control of the Directors, but in no case shall the Bears paw Community Fair Association be held responsible for any loss, damage, or injury of any nature to any such property while it is on exhibit. The Board will take reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of articles and livestock; however, property owners should make their own arrangements for protection against loss, damage or injury.

Disclaimer: Photographs of entries and participants may be taken by Fair members during the Fair to be kept for archival purposes, and may include posting a copy of the photographs on the Bears paw Fair website.

# Judging

1. Judges decisions are final!
2. Judges are asked to check for cleanliness, good repair, and if the article is possibly produced commercially (i.e. a “Made in Taiwan” tag).
3. No person other than a judge or the director in charge, along with their appointed helpers, will be allowed in the judging area once judging commences at 1:00 pm Saturday.
4. No director of the Fair shall be allowed to load or handle their stock at the exhibition while competing for prizes without removing their badges or other means of identification.
5. The judges, in the execution of their duties, are cautioned to act with the most rigid impartiality, and in all cases of doubt or difficulty, may consult the chairperson in charge of the section.
6. Standard judging (see Judging Standard Handbooks in the next section) is used in all classes, where applicable. Ribbons are awarded only to the three best entries in each class. However, if the items in a class fail to meet a reasonable level of achievement, no ribbons will be awarded.
7. Unless otherwise stated, special prizes or trophies are awarded on the basis of a total point system:

First Place: 3 points

Second Place: 2 points

Third Place: 1 point



# Horticulture

RULES - Sections 1 (Hay & Grain), 2 (Produce) & 3 (Flowers)

- 1) Refer to the General Rules and Regulations and Judging sections.
- 2) All entries to be grown by exhibitor.
- 3) Entry tag must be securely fastened to exhibit.
- 4) Variety of vegetable, grain or flower must be listed on entry form.
- 5) Paper plates will be provided for vegetable and grain displays.
- 6) Exhibitors in flower classes to provide their own containers.
- 7) Accredited judges provided by Alberta Horticultural Society.
- 8) Any entry without age stated on the entry tag will go into the Adult Section.

Best of Show rosettes will be presented by the Fair Committee in each of the following Sections:

1. Hay Section, 2. Grain Section, 3. Vegetables, 4. Vegetable Display, 5. Small Fruit, 6. Youth Horticulture, 7. Cut Flowers, 8. Flower Arrangements, 9. Potted Plants, 10. Healthy Gardening (Compost, Heritage and Chemical Free)

## **Flower Arrangement**

- In the interest of ecological preservation we are now offering Wild Flower classes in the Photography section. See class 7-10-185.

**ARRANGEMENT:** A composition of colour, size and shape to produce a pleasing effect. Each unit is placed so that all of them together produce a pleasing effect.

**BOUQUET:** A collection of flowers in a container or vase, but neither arranged nor with stems tied together or affixed in oasis or similar medium.

- 3-20-010 Diminutive - arrangement not to exceed 3" in any direction
- 3-20-020 Petite arrangement - minimum 3" and maximum 6" in any direction.
- 3-20-030 Display of Sweet Peas - arrangement in a container of exhibitor's choice (Baby's Breath may be added)
- 3-20-040 Garden Flower Bouquet - Mixed garden flowers in an old fashioned bouquet
- 3-20-060 Dried Artistic Arrangement - dried plant material in container of exhibitor's choice
- 3-20-070 Coffee Club - an arrangement in a mug.
- 3-20-080 Arrangement - Blue and/or White Teacup with Saucer using only blue and white flowers and greenery - not to exceed 8" in any direction.
- 3-20-090 "Sublime Simplicity", an arrangement featuring a single color combination of flower shapes, textures and arrangement in the vase of one's choice.

3-50-010 Noxious Weeds – Examples: - broad-leaved pepper-grass, common mullein, downy brome, japanese brome, canada thistle, common tansy, scentless chamomile, leafy spurge, perennial sow thistle, ox-eye daisy, hoary cress, common burdock, blue-weed, tall buttercup, black henbane, baby's breath, hounds tongue, white cockle, common toadflax, dames rocket, field bindweed, field scabious, yellow clematis

3-50-020 Prohibited weeds - Examples of PROHIBITED WEEDS - jointed goatgrass, meadow hawkweed, red bartsia, tansy ragwort, yellow flax iris, nodding thistle, diffuse knapweed, spotted knapweed, yellow star thistle, orange hawkweed, eurasian water milfoil, garlic mustard, sulphur cinquefoil, russian knapweed, salt cedar (aka tamarisk), himalayan balsam, purple loosestrife

2. All work must be the work of the exhibitor and not previously shown at the Fair
3. No more than one article to be entered in each class by one person except as otherwise specified.
4. Large classes may be subdivided at the discretion of the judges.
5. All thread art entries must be clean and free of pet hair.
6. Any entry without AGE STATED will go into the Adult Section.

Baking Sections: 1. Adult, 2. Teen, 3. Children, 4. Preserve & Misc

Thread Arts Sections: 5. Senior, 6. Teen, 7. Children, 8. Knitting, Crochet & Misc 9. Adult Sewing, 10. Emroidery, 11. Quilts

## **Domestic Arts (Culinary)**

- Previously frozen baking must be STATED
- It is recommended that all baking exhibits be enclosed in clear plastic bags or on a plate covered with plastic
- All cakes should be removed from pan

## **Lemon Poppyseed Sour Cream Cake**

- 1 cup (250 mL) granulated sugar
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) finely grates lemon rind
- 1 cup (250 mL) unsalted butter, softened
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 cup (60 mL) lemon juice
- 2 cups (500 mL) all-purpose flour
- 2 tbsp (30 mL) poppy seeds
- 3/4 tsp (4 mL) baking powder

- 1/2 tsp (2 mL) baking soda

### **Preparation:**

In large bowl and using fingers, rub sugar with lemon rind until fragrant. Beat in butter until light. Beat in eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each. Beat in lemon juice.

In separate bowl, whisk together flour, poppy seeds, baking powder, salt and baking soda; stir into butter mixture alter-

nately with sour cream, making 3 additions of dry ingredients and 2 of sour cream. Scrape into 8 greased and floured 1-cup (250 mL) mini Bundt pans or 5- x 3-inch (625 mL) mini loaf pans, or one 9- x 5-inch (2 L) loaf pan. Or all of it into a large Bundt pan.

Bake in 325° F (160° C) oven until cake tester inserted in centre comes out clean, about 30 minutes for Bundt pans, 1 hour for large loaf. Transfer pans to rack.

Icing: In small bowl, stir icing sugar with lemon juice until smooth. Divide in half.

Glaze: Stir lemon juice into one half of icing; brush over hot cakes. Remove from pans; let cool on rack. Drizzle with remaining icing, adding a little more lemon juice to loosen if necessary.




